FORUM MINUTES 15 March 2012 UPDATE ON PLANS FOR ST JAMES' HOSPITAL

Ted Griggs and Andy Strange from St James' Hospital, outlined plans for the hospital following the Forum's concerns over tree clearance on hospital grounds

They said that trees are numbered, and clearance is undertaken when there are concerns over danger from diseased trees. Many trees are subject to tree preservation orders (TPOs)requiring every care to be taken when remedial works/removal of trees is necessary.

There is land at the hospital deemed to be surplus to requirements, and such land will be disposed of by offering it to other NHS Trusts first. Land sold on the open market is more valuable if offered with provisional planning approval for residential development, and two sites are available now for disposal. Any residential development must take account of trees subject to preservation orders, and there is approval in the current City Plan for development on the sites.

There will be consultation with local residents when any proposals are being finalized, to enable them to comment about things such as access to the site by builders and times of building work. No access to the sites will be available via the hospital, and there will be a Community Infrastructure Levy (which is an amount payable to the local authority and which can be spent on any local authority project or scheme across the city).

Points from residents included:-Access to the site would be via small local roads, not designed for heavy traffic flow:

Consultation – who would be informed of works and how can residents comment?; Social housing constituent? – there will be social housing on both sites; Need for some infrastructure, e.g a GP surgery and/or shop; Availability of bus transport (if at all).

Residents felt that a full consultation process should be undertaken which St James' Hospital speakers supported.

13/14 BUS SERVICE

Danny Johnson (Passenger Transport Officer for Portsmouth City Council) had spoken about changes to bus services in November 2011. On 4 December 2011 the bus company had removed the No 14 service from the area leaving just the 13 service going one-way to the town centre. This was not popular so he had brought Sherisse Shelton-Smith (FirstBus Business Manager) and Ian Woodcock (FirstBus Staff Manager at Hilsea) to this meeting to give more information to passengers.

Danny stressed that the bus company operates as a commercial venture, and therefore the city council has no power to intervene in any decisions unless the routes in question are tendered (subsidised). However, he had good news for the meeting.

Danny has had discussions with Mark Reddy, FirstBus Regional Commercial Director, and it has now been agreed to register a 13A service which will operate with effect from mid-May 2012.

The new 13A will run between 1000 hours and 1400 hours to "plug the gap" at the southern end of the Eastern Road. This will incur a cost of £13,500 to the city council for a six-month trial.

lan Woodcock responded to concerns voiced by residents about the draconian way that FirstBus operates, especially its failure to listen and respond to passenger complaints. Telephone complaints and e-mails are unanswered and the Southampton customer services section fails totally to help.A damning indictment on FirstBus.

Those present feared the proposed 13A service may not be good value for money, as it can only operate when FirstBus has vehicles/staff available (1000 to 1400), and not when it is deemed to be needed (0730 to 0930).

Ian agreed to investigate the points raised, especially the abysmal service afforded by the customer services section, and to update Danny Johnson on any the issues/matters raised.

He also agreed to take action to ensure that bus stop timetables are accurate and not months out of date.

SOLENT NHS TRUST

Sarah Austin, Director of Solent NHS
Trust, explained how the new Trust will
operate in its management of
community and mental health services
locally. It is mandatory for a Trust to be
established, and her attendance at this
meeting is part-consultative.

She explained that the Trust has Governors elected from local people to oversee and audit the Trust, and that the primary aim is to retain people in their own homes for as long as possible, thus ensuring a better use of resources, including the hospital resources of St Mary's and St James' campuses.

Her presentation was welcomed by residents, and she agreed to pursue the issue of a lack of chaplain at St James' Hospital, an issue that has been ongoing for about two years.

EASTERN ROAD UPDATE

James Sandy read a document prepared by Adam Bunce, setting out the current position regarding the Milton Road/Velder Avenue works and the Eastern Road proposals:-

Milton Road/Velder Avenue works are almost completed (finish date 16th March).

Problems of timing at the junction will be resolved.

The anticipated completion date for the new hospital entrance (Rodney Road/Fratton Way) is being ascertained from the hospital.

Closure of the traffic lights at junction of Eastern Road/Kirpal Road/East Shore Way is the next stage – if this is successful, there would seem to be no need to introduce the second lane south on the Eastern Road.

The service road between Swordsands and Stride Avenue will be made one-way to prevent rat-running.

DO YOU REMEMBER THE BLITZ?

Continuing with extracts of Eddie Wallace's recollections as a City Police Fireman during World War 2

At around a quarter-to-seven on the evening of 23 December 1940, I was sitting in the Rest Room of the Single Mens' Quarters in the Central Fire Station with Bill Hodges, son of the police surgeon, Dr Hamer Hodges. We were listening to a play being broadcast on the radio when we heard a noise like a steam train going through a tunnel and which quickly got louder. Suddenly there was a terrific explosion and the whole station shook. We looked at each other and made a dash for our respective bedrooms to don jackboots and working trousers as it was obvious we would shortly be called out.

Sure enough, a few minutes later the bells went down for a "brigade call" and very shortly after, every engine in the station was on its way to the Conway Street area of Landport. On arriving there, the devastation was appalling. I was one of a crew of a turn-table ladder driver by Constable Bertie Prior and under the command of Sergeant 'Tubby' Hawkins.

There was a huge crater in the centre of what had been Conway Street and scores of houses in that very closely built-up area had simply disappeared leaving nothing more than rubble. People could be heard screaming from what had originally been their cellars but which had been turned into air raid shelters. Gas pipes servicing these houses had become broken in the explosion and as a result were setting all and sundry on fire. Water mains had burst and water was flooding into the basement cellars.

Within minutes ARP Rescue Squads were at the scene and we, as firemen, endeavoured to put out the fires but we faced a grave dilemma. People were either burning to death or were being drowned. It was not until about 30 minutes had elapsed before the Portsmouth Gas Company and Portsmouth Water Company officials arrived and the gas and water mains could be turned off.

This left us firemen without the normal means to extinguish the fires, but we set up a relay of hoses from other water mains in nearby roads to solve the problem.

Over a hundred people were killed that night. Not only householders of Conway Street and adjacent roads, but naval servicemen making their way back to Unicorn Gate at the Dockyard. I am sure that not all the people who had been killed were found. It would never surprise me to find in future years that if the area is dug over deeply, bodies will be revealed. The area is now covered by Market Way and the former Tricorn Car Park site.

To be continued with the harrowing story of 10 January 1941.

Music and the Old House at Home in the 1960s

In the early 60s, I used to play in a trio at weekends in the Old House at Home in Locks way Road. I played organ with a guitarist and a drummer, and we would play traditional pub

music plus all the latest offerings from popular groups of the time such as Herman's Hermits, the Searchers and Manfred Mann. In fact, we catered for all, and the pub would be very busy, with an early arrival needed to get a seat.

In those days, the pub was rather basic, with an old fire with a flue/chimney going up to the ceiling in the middle of the public bar. On one occasion, I recall a gentleman (he was a patient from St James' Hospital) standing next to the fire, drinking a pint, when suddenly his overcoat caught alight as he had stood too close to the open door of the fire – the only person who was unconcerned was the patient, who calmly used his hands to put out the fire and said "it's not important, it's only my old one"! The landlord was Mr Smith, who was very good to us and liked live music – no doubt, we attracted extra customers – and there were always two barmaids working.

I remember with some affection one barmaid at the pub, who was always asking me to play the Searchers' number "Every time that you walk in the room" – I always thought that she had her eye on me, but she was very tall (and I wasn't) so it was destined to only ever be a musical entanglement! Another person who springs to mind was a rather attractive lass called Thelma Rice or Price, who lived locally and often bought me a drink.

The music scene was high profile in Portsmouth in the 1960s, and I played with a group called the J. Crow Combo, and John Crow lived I believe in Rosetta Road. The Combo was managed by Ricki Farr, who set up the "Birdcage" venue, firstly at Kimbells and later in Eastney - he subsequently organised the 1969 IOW music festival and is an impresario in America now. The group turned professional later, but managers then (as now probably) were not particularly scrupulous and so I left and continued playing local clubs and venues.

It now seems that I have come "full circle" as they say, as I continue to have an involvement locally with the Milton Neighbourhood Forum. Milton is a rare find in a city like Portsmouth, retaining that village feel, and I still remember with great affection those days gone by when I played music at the village pub. What a shame that there is not a call for some "real music" in pubs now, especially as there is the non-smoking policy in force. Where there is live entertainment today, there is usually an entrance charge – in the Old House at Home in the 1960s it was free!


