The Snowdrop Field - John Cabell

Icy puddles crunched by crisply moving feet the morning mist hangs heavy where sky and hedge top meet past cottage, copse and farmyard, fences green with mould hands thrust deep in pockets, guard against the cold.

Past schoolhouse hushed and peaceful, its hand bell by the door the lines of desks quite empty, a book lies on the floor.

Follow the grey flint wall 'till the old church tower appears that hides behind the evergreens, unchanging through the years the old cast gate hangs crooked, weathered green in keeping with the headstones, this way and that they lean.

But just as natures work declines to dust all wither back in time on re-creation she is bent, to bring to each and every eye, a masterpiece that's heaven sent.

For past the beeches standing bare entwined amid the mist-damped air my eyes behold a wondrous sight, a table laid in purest white.

On gently rolling meadow, wherin the chestnut stands in offering of this wonderment it proudly spreads its hands and though its crown will not be worn 'til warmer days abound this winter's morn has gladly spread its jewels on the ground.

For gathered in their thousands by hedge and tree and bank spring snowdrop upon snowdrop, in rank on rank each delicate head hangs shyly, each holds a droplet clear to spill upon the frost greyed grass, each orbe a falling tear.

And over all there hangs a hush a quite, a peace, no sound, no rush the trials of life, they cease to be there's just Snowdrop, sky and earth and me.

What Does Your Committee Do?

Since the last Forum, the Committee has been involved in the major planning applications which have come forward

ASDA Development - A letter of objection was prepared and sent to the Planning Officer with copies to Planning Committee members and Ward Councillors. A Forum Deputation was prepared to speak at Committee but the Councillors had no need to hear the 14 objectors to the scheme. After the University's Dr Bateman and ASDA'srepresentative had spoken, the Planning Committee overwhelmingly rejected the application. However, this is only the first of 2 similar applications submitted to the City Council and residents should be aware that ASDAcould not only pursue the second application through Committee but also appeal against the decision reached on the first.

ST JAMES HOSPITAL Development of 74 homes by Bovis on the north playing field was approved. Your Committee had written in concerned about homes being too close to the trees which have Tree Preservation Orders but were assured at the Committee that Bovis will be providing root barriers - special protection for the tree roots - so that in years to come we do not expect to have requests from occupiers to have any trees removed because of threat to foundations or drains! Bob Colley is the officer at Portsmouth City Council to whom any queries on the removal, treatment of trees, etc., during building works should be addressed. His phone number is 01705 834310. The Planning Committee confirmed that the Bovis Phase 2 development must provide a completed play space of .55 hectares within the housing scheme as a condition of building the 74 homes.

At the last Forum you asked the Committee to object to the development of 200 houses and flats on remaining land in St James Hospital grounds. This was done but the case was lost. However, at the Planning Committee, the Portsmouth Society announced that it would like to pursue the possibility of making a bid for funds from the Heritage Lottery Fund in the hope of buying the site and providing a new urban park for the City. We shall keep a watch on how this ambitious scheme progresses. It would of course, need a share of the costs to be raised. If you have any ideas or suggestions on how this could be achieved, do share them with us, using the FREEPOST address.

Over 80 forms were completed by the residents who visited the display in the Beddow Library on St James and ASDA developments were forwarded to the Planning Department.

Neighbourhood notification was raised at the last Forum and the Committee wrote to the Planning Officer expressing your concerns that more people close to planning application sites should be notified. In the case of St. James proposals, the Planning Department wrote to 110 homes as well as putting up site notices in Godwit Road, Warren Ave. and Locksway Road. The Forum has offered to hand deliver more letters in future to ensure that wider notification could be achieved.

Your Forum Committee wants to ensure that you have an opportunity to voice your concerns and that these can be addressed at the Public meeting. ORIGINS OF FOSTER HALL

Milton House was the home of Rear Admiral Philip Henderson-Durham. His land and part of Middle Farm with it house was brought by the Portsmouth Corporation to use for the College Hostel. Milton Farm, Middle and Lower Farms were owned by members of the Goldsmith Family. James Goldsmith died in 1911, and most of the land through a legacy became Milton Park including the original large elm trees and the thatched barn. Locksway Road at that time was called Asylum Road.

Foster Hall was built on the site of the original house. It was named after Alderman F G Foster JP, Chairman of the Education Committee for 45 years. The college walled garden had espalier fruit trees up the walls. With wartime regulations part of Milton Park was dug up for allotments and so was the walled garden. Dig for victory was encouraged so people grew vegetables for themselves.

Miss G Barber, the Biology Lecturer had three bee hives in the walled garden.

The biology students helped with the maintenance of the hives and extracting the honey.

There was a large old mulberry tree outside the wall opposite the office window.

Some of the leaves were used for feeding silkworms. Students took silkworms to some of the local schools for lessons with the children. When the mulberries were ripe the ground was covered in the squashy fruits.

In front of Foster Hall there was a pond to provide specimens for nature study of frogs, newts, dragon flies and other insect larvae.

The beautiful avenue of red and white horsechestnut trees led from the Milton Road gate to the front door. Local small boys used to run in and throw sticks and stones to knock down the conkers which they collected.

There were tennis courts and a hockey pitch behind the houses of Locksway Road.

At a later date after the War the college buildings were extended with some single storey rooms for craft and music on the side by the railings of the Old Canal footpath. A large building of many storeys was built on the site of the tennis courts and hockey pitch. That had many lecture rooms and another library. A drama studio was added at the walled garden end.

Foster Hall was completed at the southern end to match the original block. Student numbers increased and men joined the college for the first time. The course was increased to three years when the Batchelor of Education Degree was introduced. A refectory was built on the front lawn. Some years later the refectory was enlarged and was known as the aquarium or goldfish bowl as the walls were almost entirely glass.

Portsmouth Training College for Women Teachers had changed completely and it then became the Faculty of Education as a part of the Portsmouth Polytechnic. A great contrast to the small college of the Wartime Years.

NOTE

In Pre-War Days all the teachers in the Infants and Girls' Schools were Women. Junior Schools had separate floors or department for Boys with Male Teachers, and Girls with Female Teachers. The Secondary Schools were single sex.

When a lady teacher married she had to give up her work. In a few cases the War Widows returned to teaching.

During the War, the schools reopened, as evacuees returned to the City and some did not go away at all. Children went to the nearest school to their homes so in many cases all ages from 5-14 years were in the same building, often with a 2 year age range in the class with numbers from 30-50 in it. Many of the building were bombed or used for other purposes.

OVER TO YOU MILTON

Our speaker at the next Forum is a former University lecturer who left th Education service in Birmingham to join Portsmouth and run its Education service from April this year.


Her particular interest is in early years education. She has stated she wishes t improve school quality - proving the brilliant work already being done an improving areas where there are deficiencies.

Summary Of Forum Meeting 25th September 1996

Opening the meeting Vice Chairperson Janice Burkinshaw welcomed members councillors and the guest speakers Mr Rob Hutchinson - Social Services, Ian Parkinson and Chris Murray - PCC Planning Officers.

Chairwoman's Report

Mrs Burkinshaw gave an update of Forum activities including Milton Common works, Portsmouth City Council cycle strategy and QEQM playing field policies. The Forum magazine competition winners were announced.

Social Services

Mr Hutchinson gave a detailed presentation of the role of Social Services within the new Portsmouth Unitary status from April 1997. He explained the range of facilities available and the efforts being made by his department to keep abreast of social problems. He gave an account of local children in care and the procedures for dealing with them. Mr Hutchinson said he welcomed suggestions for improving services and concluded by answering members questions.

The chairwoman said an approach to Mr Hutchinson had led to the formation of a Management - Residents committee to discuss specific problems at Lightfoot Lawn.

Forum Elections - Mr D. Pointon

Mr Pointon explained that the constitution required the post of secretary to be re-elected and thanked Mr Tony Knott for his three years of service. In the absence of new nominees the outgoing secretary offered his services for a new term and was re-elected unanimously.

Mrs IIsley and Mrs Baxter were nominated as new Forum Representatives and voted in unanimously.

Update on Traffic Issues - Chairwoman

A letter from the City Engineer (Mr Peter King) was read to the meeting. The Forum would have to tackle outstanding issues and volunteers were requested to work with the committee.

Residents who complained of the ineffectiveness of recently installed road humps were advised to write to the city Engineer.

Bus routes in Milton were fully discussed and it was agreed the Forum would take this up with the appropriate authorities.

4. St James Hospital Site - Ian Parkinson

Mr Parkinson retraced the history of the site development before presenting the latest application by Bovis Homes and the possible traffic impact. He presented the outline plans including cycle routes and general traffic patterns. An impact study commissioned by the Health Authority would not necessarily be acceptable to Portsmouth City Council. During questions by residents became evident that neighbourhood notification of the scheme was insufficient. The chairwoman was asked to write to PCC requesting wider publicity of Planning Proposals.

5. Tree Preservation

ASDA - Chris Murray

Mr Murray explained the City Council position regarding various plans submitted and the legal process they have to follow.

The ASDA proposals include a 60,000 sq. ft. store area, parking for 600 cars and road changes designed by their traffic consultants. In explaining the impact on the area the points raised included:-

Closure of existing footpaths and towpaths.

Noise and light pollution to neighbouring residences.

The effect on local shops and businesses as well as the city as a whole.

The additional traffic load on an already congested area for 24 hrs a day (including loading etc.).

The residential nature of Milton was not suited for such a large retail complex.

Letters of protest are already pouring in . Mr Murray was aware of the unrest and assured the meeting that every aspect of the plan would be carefully considered. He said it was the duty of the Council to seek opinions from everyone. To this end details of the plan and petition forms would be displayed in Milton Public Library throughout the following week.

All present were opposed to the proposals and it was unanimously agreed to request the Milton Forum Committee to present the views of its members at the forthcoming Planning application meeting.

Councillors Bye, Charlton, Sizer and Spurgeon promised their support to the residents of their respective wards.


